

C) I have been involved in a number of curriculum development and research initiatives

linked to learning and teaching history including working for the BBC; designing schemes of work for history for the Department of Education to act as guidance for schools; creating programmes for Teachers' TV; researching the challenges and opportunities for teaching controversial and emotive issues in history for the Historical Association and Department of Education.

- D) I have been an active partner in a number of significant European projects which is a particular useful experience since it has provided opportunities to work with a wide range of European colleagues and to appreciate the challenges which they meet in different European contexts. Work for the Council of Europe has involved 3 key note presentations at important seminars on history education across Europe.
- E) I am a member of the CiCe network ( Children's Identity and Citizenship in Europe ) and a founder member of its International Centre for Research. I have organised research conferences for doctoral students on the theme of citizenship on a yearly basis which have been highly regarded. This may be something which Euroclio might consider developing – I am sure that many research students researching aspects of history education would benefit from meeting together and sharing ideas – thus contributing to Euroclio's wider impact and sustainability

- F) I have strong links with local schools and teachers and am aware of the challenges which they encounter in implementing the curriculum. I am also working with local museums and have recently completed a F7 European bid linking using mobile technologies with museums learning.
- G) My PhD studied the development and implementation of the history curriculum in primary schools in England in the twentieth century. It involved an analysis of policy documents and also consideration of how the curriculum was implemented including the important role of teachers' subject knowledge. It thus provides a useful experience in considering the challenges of curriculum implementation and development in European states.
