17:15 Stereotypes and implicit bias in education

Keynote lecture by Dr. Loes Meeussen, Center for Social and Cultural Psychology at the University of Leuven

This lecture provides an overview of research on stereotypes and (implicit) bias. Dr. Meeussen outlines the function and origin of stereotypes and the psychological processes through which they affect our own choices, our evaluations of others, and as such, people's chances and success. Next, she discusses different strategies and structural changes that can prevent the use of stereotypes in order to reduce inequalities in educational contexts.

About the workshop hosts

Dr. Loes Meeussen is a senior researcher at the Center for Social and Cultural Psychology at the University of Leuven, Belgium; Lector in Applied Psychology at Thomas More Antwerp, Belgium; and member of the Young Academy in Belgium. In her research, she studies inequality from a social psychological perspective: inequalities in culturally diverse schools and organizations on the one hand, and gender inequality in work and family roles on the other hand. How do people cope with stereotypes that exist about their group? And what characterizes inclusive contexts in which everyone can function optimally?

17:15 Stereotypes and prejudices in learning history

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Workshop by Marko Šuica, University of Belgrade

This workshop will focus on teaching strategies and lesson plans that can be used to challenge stereotypes and preconceptions. Questions about stereotypes as a regular occurrence in everyday life, distinctions between "positive" and "negative" stereotypes and their relation to the classroom will be tackled in this session.

About the workshop hosts

Marko Šuica is a Professor of history and lectures in History at the University of Belgrade. His specialty is medieval Balkan history, history didactics, curricula design and assessment. He is active in educational projects and teacher training on national, regional and international level. He is the author of several textbooks, additional teaching materials, education standards and history curricula. He is also a consultant on Council of Europe anti-discrimination and national minorities programs, member and project advisor of EuroClio and the International Society for History Didactics.

17:00 THINK, FEEL AND CARE: challenging stereotypes in the history class

Workshop hosted by Emma Abbate, Liceo Scientifico A. Diaz, Caserta

This workshop will expose participants to hands-on examples of how teachers can analyze prejudices and stereotypes in history class. Forms of racism with grave consequences will be explored during the workshop, in order to give teachers the tools to explain how mechanisms of discrimination and exclusion work and how they can be deconstructed. This workshop offers step-by-step techniques teachers

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can be used to increase students' awareness of how the pyramid of hate is generated from biased ideas. It will include a discussion of ways teachers can assist students in developing skills to recognize and challenge preconceptions and injustices while studying syllabus contents. The seminar will draw on Harvard Project Zero's Thinking Routine "Think, Feel, Care", an approach to visual history that allows looking closely at pictures or other documents during the lesson. A discussion of helpful internet sources to implement the topic from Europeana and other databases (Pilecki and Arolsen digital Archives) will also be included, together with a bibliography of Council of Europe's educational toolkits intended to end stereotypes.

About the workshop hosts

Emma Abbate is a teacher of Latin, History, and Geography in English since 1998/9, expert in CLIL (Content and Language Integrated Learning) methodology and Cultural & Linguistic Mediation, with a Ph.D. in History (University Federico II, Naples).

She teaches in the Cambridge International IGCSE® High School Armando Diaz (Caserta), she is author of digital content and free-lance researcher.

Emma cooperates with the University of Naples L' Orientale as a CLIL teachers' trainer, she gained specific expertise in Erasmus+ project management as coordinator of several projects funded by the EU.
